REFLECTIONS





November 17, 2024

Dear Friends,

The sights and sounds of Odesa welcome me home every time I go back: the golden onion domes of the churches, the train station, the tall steeple of the cathedral, the opera house, the Potemkin Staircase overlooking the port on the Black Sea, my little marketplace, the City Garden – all familiar sights among many others, accompanied by the beeping of horns, the clickety-clack of the trams on their tracks and the screeching of the brakes on the marshrutkas. Now, however, there are some new sounds added to the mix – air raid sirens, which are often followed by explosions.

We heard the sirens as we were getting ready for bed shortly after our arrival in Odesa, and they quickly became a regular part of our daily lives. The explosions were a bit more disconcerting, but as the days of our trip counted down, the explosions thankfully became fewer and fewer. We experienced a day without electricity, and another without water. We felt the weather become cooler and then downright chilly to this cold-sensitive Floridian. The city had not yet turned the heat on, prompting me to pile on layers of clothing in the house and even more layers outside, giving me flashbacks of my first winter in Odesa when I had no heat in my apartment.

Despite these reminders that there was a war going on around us, we had places to go and people to see, and we didn't let anything get in our way. Every day was busy with planning, preparing, meeting, shopping, and visiting with our teammates and families. There was so much to accomplish in so little time together. We met with each team member individually to listen, share, and problem-solve. We managed one big dinner together. Nearly three years of war have definitely taken a toll on our folks. We could see that they are simply exhausted from the stress and strain, yet they remain faithful to our mission of caring for orphans and vulnerable families and willingly pitch in to do whatever needs to be done.

Planning for Christmas was a main goal of this trip. Our Christmas Project this year will again benefit the orphans and vulnerable children and families in the village of Pishana and the surrounding villages. This fall, after a renovation of the orphanage's bomb shelter, the orphanage was given permission to have all the children return to the orphanage to live and to attend school classes there. While it may seem strange to be rejoicing to see children return to an orphanage, this is truly a blessing for these children. The previous four and a half years (two years of covid and two and a half years of war) sent the children back to the villages to live in less than ideal living conditions and meant little to no educational opportunity for the children. A return to the orphanage gives them the structure and schooling that they so need. Please read on for a summary of our Christmas Project and opportunities for you to join in and help.

Christmas Project 2024 - Odesa, Ukraine

Christmas Packages (30 families/100 children)

Our team in Odesa will be purchasing and preparing everything needed for these packages and will mail them to the families in the villages prior to December 25 so that the families can enjoy them during the holidays. There are three parts to these packages:

- 1. **Food** staples and some special Christmas treats and food items will be given to each family. Each bag of food will cost about \$125.
- 2. **Warm clothing** for the children a warm sweatshirt, pants, shoes, a hat and gloves will be provided for each of the children. This will cost \$50-\$75 per child.
- 3. **Heavy duty, rechargeable flashlights** will be purchased for each family, as well. Since Ukraine's electric grids have been heavily damaged, electricity is often absent for hours, and even days, at a time, and we anticipate this to continue throughout the winter. Flashlights are estimated to be about \$50 each.

Christmas Mini Camps

After the New Year, when all of the children will be on break from school and home with relatives, we will provide Christmas camps in each village where our children live. The camps will include a Christmas story skit, Christmas carols,

crafts, games, snacks and small gifts. We will include neighborhood kids, and we've learned that some of the parents and grandparents like to join in the fun, too. We are planning 12 camps and estimate that each one will cost \$200 to cover gas, supplies, and gifts.

*Any donations we receive above and beyond the needs for these projects will be used as:

Christmas bonuses for our faithful staff, without whom these projects could not happen.

Food bags for the Pishana Orphanage staff who kindly work with us to allow us the opportunity to work with the children.

Ongoing support of our transition homes and continuing projects.
