

OUR PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

Hi Folks,

Kristine and I went to Longwood Gardens, with family friends, to see the Tulips



blooming, along with other flowers and plants. It had been quite a while since I had been there. I have to say, even though some of the Tulips were past their peak, they were still wonderful. Tulips are one of my favorite flowers. There were some with frilly edges. There were some with several colors. And there were some as big as two hands side-by-side. I think the best Tulips of all weren't in the long beds of flowers. They were in raised planters, inside a fenced in patio. I'm so glad I decided to walk in there. They could have been easily missed.

It can be easy to miss signs of God's goodness. How many times have we just walked past, a most wonderful flower, and not really paid any attention to it?

I do like flowers, and I have a bunch planted around my yard. But for the most part, I like flowers from a distance. I'm really looking forward to flowers in heaven, where I'll be able to enjoy them up close.

That evening I had the opportunity to hear Charlie Zahm sing, Kendrah Tozzo play her harp, and Jonathan

Welk play his bagpipes. This was an opportunity to hear songs, to hear notes, of God's goodness. In Heaven I hope to sing like The Three Irish Tenors, or like Charlie Zahm, or like Craig Williams. In Heaven I hope to learn instruments like the fiddle and the banjo and the piano and the bagpipes from masters like Kendra and Jonathan. We'll get-together and sing and play like I see on TV when I watch PBS programs like The Three Irish Tenors, or The Grand Ole Opry, or the orchestra and singers led by Andre Rieu. I

want to learn the Violin and play like Lindsey Stirling. I want to learn the Hammer Dulcimer.

Again, how easy it can be to miss signs of God's goodness. I'm so glad I got to go to that Covenanter Concert. How easy it could have been just to stay home and miss it.

I see signs of God's goodness in: flowers; music; singing voices; musical instruments; colors; trees; fields of sweet corn and pumpkins; vegetable gardens; sunrises and sunsets; Autumn blue sky; sunlight reflecting on water; and in the stars and the moon in the night sky. I see God's goodness in family and in friendships. I taste God's goodness in good cooking. I try not to miss God's goodness. But sometimes I do because I just pass it all by and I end up missing it.



There's been a lot of sinfulness, fallenness, stuff I call yuckiness in the big headlines of the world recently. I encourage you to be aware of what's going on, but please don't let this stuff take your full attention. Make time and space for God and be intentional about seeing signs of God's goodness.



Here's some Scripture verses that have been on my mind during this time.

Psalm 46:10 Be still and know that I am God ...

It's good for us to stand quietly before God, honoring his power and majesty.

Psalm 103:15-17 As for a man, his days are like grass, he flourishes like a flower of the field; the wind blows over it and it is gone, and its place remembers it no more. But from everlasting to everlasting the Lord's love is with those who fear him, and his righteousness with their children's children – with those who keep his covenant and remember to obey his precepts.

It's good for us to remember that we are fragile, but God's care is eternal.



What to Think?

Where are we at Middle Octorara? We are paying the bills and dealing with an aging population. It is a temporary situation. We have no families with small children, few families with teens, and no traditional Christian Education experiences (Sunday School and Bible School) for Youth. We do have the non-traditional Kids Zone-It which is working very well. However, to me the overall picture spells doom in regard to the future of Middle Octorara.

It is all the rage today to say that society is changing and the Church must do its work “outside the walls.” Well, we certainly do more “outside the walls” stuff than any church of our size in the County. But, is it doing anything to improve inside the walls? Think about it. This is where the givers are.

Are we bringing people to Christ, or are we trying to justify ourselves through our good works? Should we identify the unchurched families in our area and make an attempt to bring them in through a creative mix of the traditional and non-traditional? This would take a lot of hard work. We have many excuses: times change, only charismatic and mega churches have the approaches and money needed to attract the younger set, etc.

Why would I want to identify the unchurched and work on creative approaches to Church both inside and outside the walls? Current research suggests the old model of Sunday School and Bible School is not working because:

*Most people are not looking for a church to attend.

*Young people especially feel they are being “lured” into church and they aren’t interested in that.

*The church needs to focus on being Jesus outside of the walls...as opposed to bringing people in.

*Physical and emotional needs need to be met in order for faith development to occur.

*Developing trusting relationships that model Christ is key to connecting people to the Church.

Some even suggest that the millennials and perhaps their parents are closer to deists than Christians. Thus, there is no need for a personal relationship with the creator, indeed it is a waste of time and energy. The creator gave us a brain capable of acting as a moral compass. Religion is using that brain to do good.

The challenge is real! So, let’s stop worrying about how we got to where we are today, and start thinking about work both inside and outside the walls. Developing those “trusting relationships” that model Christ can certainly take place in both areas.
